#### INTERSECTING IMPACTS

Education Health Care Access and Access and Quality Quality Many of the same factors prevent both maltreatment and poor health outcomes: SDOH Neighborhood Economic and Built Stability Environment Social and Community Context

Because much of the secondary trauma to families occurs as a result of system involvement, addressing disproportionality, equity and access issues demands that we do the pre-work of integrating delivery systems Poverty, racism and systemic absence of access to supports and care are key drivers of entry into all government "systems", including Child Welfare and Probation.

Child welfare seeks upstream prevention strategies & funds—while Medicaid increasingly addresses SDOH.



#### **Upstream prevention**

Provide children, youth, and families in the community with access to services and supports to meet emerging needs.



#### Intensive evidence-based services

Provide children, youth, and families in the community with access to services and supports to meet emerging needs living in the community.



#### Tailored services for children in foster care


Proactively address trauma and mental & behavioral health challenges for children and youth in foster care.

#### **NEW ROLES IN THE SYSTEM OF CARE**

Child Welfare and Probation now play a full role in prevention, beyond the policing frame and embracing a new place as a communitybased intervention. (Community Supporting)

In California, numerous "cogs" in the prevention ecosystem are increasingly outside the CWS/Justice System

Medicaid is both an essential and underleveraged financing strategy for families at risk of entering child welfare or probation, and must be reimagined and transformed to let go its overmedicalization of what are otherwise basic needs



#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- FFPSA, FFPS & the CPP provide extraordinary opportunity to transform Child and Family Services in partnership with the MediCal Mental Health Delivery System in California.
- Sustained and structured interagency collaboration (AB 2083) leads to effectiveness and efficiency of services, and sustainability of funding/programming.
- There is an unprecedented level of investment (10+ Billion) and a shifting payor landscape to negotiate
- Those investments, via parallel opportunities, are only known and discoverable when you're all at the table...including Managed Care Plans and schools
