

THE CONTINUOUS WOUND!



The Father Absence Crisis in America

Research shows² when a child is raised in a father-absent home,

they are affected in the following ways...



Million Children, Nearly 1 in 4, Without a Biological, Step, or Adoptive Father at Home¹



National Fatherhood Initiative®

- ← 4x Greater Risk of Poverty
- More Likely to Have Behavioral Problems
- 2x Greater Risk of Infant Mortality
- More Likely to Go to Prison
- 7x More Likely to Become Pregnant as a Teen
- More Likely to Face Abuse and Neglect
- More Likely to Abuse Drugs and Alcohol
- 2x More Likely to Suffer Obesity
- 2x more Likely to Drop Out of School

IMPORTANCE OF FATHERS.

-Children with involved, loving fathers are-

- More likely to do well in school.
- Have healthy self-esteem.
- Exhibit empathy and pro-social behavior.
- Avoid high-risk behaviors such as drug use, truancy, and delinquent activity.
- Research also shows that fathers are as important as mothers in their children's outcomes.



Why is Father Involvement Important to Children?

The Strengths
of Father Presence

Children with involved fathers have a strong foundation for child well-being.

They are at lower risk for a host of poor childhood outcomes.

FATHER INVOLVEMENT IMPORTANT FOR BOTH MOTHERS:



- Encouragement (motivate, esteem)
- Emotional support
- Better overall health
- Access to more resources



Father Involvement important for Mothers!



- More likely to receive prenatal care
- Less likely to smoke during pregnancy
- W Healthier births
- Cower risk of post-partum stress
- Cower risk of post-partum depression
- Lower parenting stress
- More leisure time
- Higher marital satisfaction

Father Involvement important for Dad!

Why Involved Dads are Good for ...Dads!

When men become dads and are involved in their children's lives, they transform in many ways. They:



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- Are happier
- Have better physical and mental health
- **W** Live longer
- W Have less depression
- W Have increased self-esteem
- Are more active in their community
- Are more involved with civic groups
- Are moved to:
 - Adopt a healthier model of masculinity
 - Reduce alcohol and substance use
 - → Find stable, secure jobs
 - Better manage and save money
 - → Strengthen family ties

WHEN FATHERS ARE INVOLVED IN CHILD WELFARE SERVICES



- Children spend fewer days in foster care.
- More likely to be reunified with parents.
- Protect against future maltreatment.
- Additional perspectives/placement options.
- Social and financial resources.
- Paternal family history and traditions.
- Positive systemic effects beyond the individual family.



WHY MEN MATTER - BOTH NOW AND FOREVER (FAITH BASED COMMUNITY)

- When a mother comes to Church, her family will join her at church only 17% of the time; but when a father comes to Church, his family joins him 93% of the time
- Churches overseas report gender gaps of up to 9 women for every adult man in attendance.
- The typical U.S. Congregation draws an adult crowd that's 61% female, 39% male. This gender gap shows up in all age categories.

Factors that Predict Father Involvement

Many factors affect how involved a father is with his children.

These are the most vital.

They create strong bonds between fathers and their children.



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- Good Parenting or Co-Parenting Relationship
- Stable Relationship
 with Partner/Other Parent
- Partner/Other Parent Supports His Involvement
- Friends and Family Support His Involvement
- **Supports** His Involvement
- Satisfied with Marriage
- In or Finished a Fatherhood or Parenting Program
- **▼ Involved in His Partner's Pregnancy**
- V Lives with Children
- W Being a Dad Vital to His Identity
- **Omega Children Look Like Him**
- **W** No Depression
- **No Substance Abuse**
- **No Domestic Violence**
- Partner/Other Parent Doesn't Restrict Access to His Children

BEST PRACTICES FOR FATHER ENGAGEMENT

Attitude over skill

Recognize and acknowledge possible disparities with fathers in our systems.

Embrace father/ Paternal as a viable placement option, support & resource

Help father focus on their strengths.

Help dad take advantage of support services



Provide knowledgeable and approachable initial male contact when possible or based on family need..

Help to educate all on fatherhood data.

TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICE "DADS HAVE TRAUMA TO!"

- ➤ Awareness- of the extensive and complicated presence of trauma is a foundation for traumainformed practice.
- Safety- Considerations of safety include physical, emotional, spiritual, and cultural safety. And all are important elements in engaging with fathers in a trauma-informed way.
- > Choice, Collaboration, and Connection.



FATHERS ACCUSED OF INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE (IPV)

- Planning for Long-Term Safety
- Safety Threat vs. Safety Concern.
- Helping support father in having a network for safety.
 - Using these supports for initial monitoring.
- Understanding the particulars of how and when IPV occurs, and safety planning around those issues.
 - Is substance abuse an issue?
 - Mental health?
 - Job stress?
 - Housing instability?

<u>-Remember Dads can be the Victim</u> <u>Also!</u>





THE DILEMWA

- "If I allow the children to be around a parent with a violent history and they are hurt, will I be accused of not adequately protecting the children?"
- "If I don't engage the father am I depriving the child of resources that would enrich their lives and hasten their departure from the CPS system"
- " Are there enough resources in the department and or out in the Community for dad"
- This is where Community Based & Faith Based Organizations can help by providing information about resources that might not be known.



HELPING DAD TO RECONNECT

- 1. Get Stability
- 2. Communicate the intention
- 3. Learn about the child/ren
- 4. Meet in a safe environment
- 5. Learn your child/ren's love language
- 6. Don't be "fun-time" dad all the time
- 7. Get on your child's level
- Don't try and change what is working in the child's world.
- 9. Be consistent and predictable
- 10. Keep promises


- 4. Who are the people who you don't ask for support from but maybe could in the future?
- Who are the people who don't support you and maybe make things harder for you and your family?
- Who are the people in your life who don't know anything about the hard things you've been dealing with?

- 2. Who are the people who support you the most?
- Who do the children feel most connected to?
- Who already knows everything that happened?

- 3. Who are the people who support you a little?
- Who do the children feel some connection with?
- Who already knows a little bit about the hard things you've been dealing with?



RIGHT NOW ACTIONS!



- Identify and assess current father involvement on your teams and explore contact with fathers; "How father friendly is your agency?"
- Talk with your youth regarding potential male family members who can serve as role models if no father is present (uncles, grandfathers, cousins, etc.)
- Support mothers in being open to father's involvement in visits/activities and CFT meetings
- Recognize and put aside any bias you may have in working with non-custodial/inactive fathers
